#### Report of the Board of Trustees

For the year ended 31 December 2010

The Board of Trustees is pleased to present its annual report and audited financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2010. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on pages 10 and 11 and comply with the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities 2005. The reference and administrative details on page 1 form part of this report.

#### Structure, Governance and Management

The Foundation is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and was incorporated on 1 July 2003 and registered as a charity on 10 October 2003. The charity is administered by a board of trustees which meets a minimum of three times a year. An Executive Director who is not a trustee is appointed by the board to manage the day-to-day operations of the charity.

#### Recruitment and induction of trustees

Suitable candidates are selected by the existing trustees and invited to become trustees. New trustees are inducted into the workings of the charity.

#### Objects of the charity

These are:

- The promotion of any charitable purposes for the benefit of the community in the county of Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly and in particular the advancement of education, the protection of good health, both mental and physical and the relief of poverty and sickness.
- Other exclusively charitable purposes in the United Kingdom and elsewhere which are in the opinion of the trustees beneficial to the community including those in the area of benefit.

A review of the charity's activities, achievements and future developments is included in the Chairman's review on page 5.

#### **Public benefit and aims**

The charity complies with the public benefit requirement through its grant making programmes.

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities and setting the grant making policy each year.

The grant making programmes are wholly directed at supporting community groups within Cornwall.

The charity's fund development work is aimed at ensuring the funds continue to be available in the future so that income can be generated to continue to support the above groups for the benefit of the residents in the county.

#### **Investment powers and policy**

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the charity has the power to make any investments which the trustees see fit. The trustees regularly review internal financial information to ensure their financial position is such that it is adequate to provide sufficient resources to perform the charity's objects in all types of conditions and to act accordingly. The Trustees have reflected on the need to balance risk and return on its reserves and have decided to maintain the majority of its investments in interest bearing accounts.

#### **Grant making policy**

The charity considers applications for funding support on a regular basis. Applications are reviewed against specific criteria and the amount granted is based on available funds.

#### Reserves policy

It is the trustees' view that it is prudent to accumulate free reserves to be able to cover anticipated administration costs to sustain its operations, when income generating activities may temporarily cease. The trustees initially set aside a substantial proportion of the free reserves as a development fund for the early years building of the Foundation. This has been utilised in the year.

#### Risk assessment

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, as identified by the trustees, and have established systems to mitigate those risks. This is an ongoing procedure and is subject to regular annual review.

#### Financial review

The total incoming resources for the year were £1,220,286 (2009: £1,137,371). Total outgoing resources were £703,664 (2009: £722,902), giving net incoming resources of £516,622 (2009: £414,469). The net movement in funds for the year was £583,357 (2009: £427,048) after other recognised investment gains of £66,735 (2009: £12,579).

#### **Auditors**

A resolution proposing that Robinson Reed Layton be reappointed as auditors will be submitted to the Annual General Meeting.

#### Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Charity law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the trustees have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). The financial statements are required by law to give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the surplus or deficit of the charity for that period. In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy the financial position of the charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with applicable law. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and for taking reasonable steps to prevent and detect fraud and other irregularities.

#### Statement of disclosure to auditor

So far as the directors are aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditors are unaware. #### Chairman's review of activities, achievements and future developments

2010 was another year in which the Cornwall Community Foundation extended its reach further into the County's life. During the year 345 different projects benefited from grants made through the Foundation, to a total value of £489,636. We manage an Endowment fund of £1.53 million, of which £145,839 constitutes the Foundation's own reserves. We calculate that by the end of December £3.7 million has now been distributed by the Foundation in its relatively short life.

We have now come to the end of Grass Roots, a three year programme initiated by central Government, where small grants have been distributed by community foundations across the country. In Cornwall we have been able to demonstrate that this is an effective way of delivering funds to voluntary groups in deprived areas, without the need for an expensive bureaucracy. We are hopeful that recognition of this will enable us to continue playing our part in the 'Big Society' agenda.

In every year we continue through our grants team to build our knowledge base of where community groups are most effective in Cornwall. Our county has the largest proportion of volunteers per head of the population, anywhere in the whole country. The Big Society has truly been active here, long before it became a political catchphrase. We are now conducting 'seeing is believing' visits whereby our donors can meet at first hand the people that their generosity has helped. The one comment that seems to come back with more frequency than others is the hope and optimism of those who often find themselves in really dire circumstances.

Added to the continuing economic recession, Cornwall now faces retrenchment of expenditure by both central and local Government. This continues to place pressure on voluntary groups who may no longer be able to access streams of funding that they had depended on. The Foundation has frequently been able to step in to fill this gap, but there can be no doubt that ends do not always meet for some of our voluntary organisations. The social and economic issues have not simply gone away.

We have increased the membership of the Cornwall 100 club, designed for small and medium sized enterprises within the County. We have focussed in particular in helping businesses fulfil their obligations for corporate social responsibility. However it would be wrong to focus on the obligatory side, most of the Cornwall 100 members are hugely enthusiastic about increasing their participation in the community. They run their own grants panels, and increasingly their own fund raising events. It is a privilege for the Foundation to act as a facilitator for these initiatives which so many of our fine local companies are signing up for.

A new initiative has been the formation of the London Club. There are many who reside some of the time in Cornwall, but whose place of work is somewhere else. We launched this Club in September and have had an enthusiastic response from many who gain great pleasure from time spent in Cornwall, but who would like to give something back to the Community.

I would like on behalf of the Trustees to pay tribute to our hard working staff led by Linda Whittaker. One of the major tasks of 2010 was to ensure that we qualified under the next round of quality accreditation, so that we would be positioned to bid for contracts from the most discerning fund providers. We have heard recently that we have again been accepted as a fully accredited organisation, which ensures that we can maintain our place at the top table. We also have increasing numbers of volunteers who help to ensure that events and publicity is achieved, or who help by attending grants panels. A community foundation must be just that, embracing all aspects of community life, and our volunteers and friends help us to embody this spirit.

Finally I would like to thank my fellow Trustees who help to steer us through the challenges that we have to face, and who themselves work with great energy to help us achieve our objective. This is to provide funds throughout Cornwall to improve people's lives.

## Independent auditors' report to the Members of Cornwall Community Foundation

We have audited the financial statements of Cornwall Community Foundation for the year ended 31 December 2010 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Summary Income and Expenditure Account, the Balance Sheet and the related notes. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditor

As explained more fully in the statement of trustees' responsibilities set out on page 3, the trustees (who are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view.

Our responsibility is to audit and express an opinion on the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland). Those standards require us to comply with the Auditing Practices Board's Ethical Standards for Auditors.

Scope of the audit of the financial statements

An audit involves obtaining evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements sufficient to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or error. This includes an assessment of: whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the charitable company's circumstances and have been consistently applied and adequately disclosed; the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by the trustees; and the overall presentation of the financial statements.

Opinion on financial statements

In our opinion the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the state of the charitable company's affairs as at 31 December 2010, and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure, for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Practice; and
- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

#### 1 Constitution

The company is incorporated as a company limited by guarantee and does not have share capital. In the event of the company being wound up each member is liable to contribute a sum not exceeding £1 towards the debts and liabilities of the company and the costs, charges and expenses of winding up. There were 16 members at 31 December 2010 (2009: 17).

#### 2 Accounting policies

#### 2.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified for the valuation of investments, in accordance with applicable accounting standards, and follow the recommendations in Statement of Recommended Practice: "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005.

The company is exempt from the requirement of financial reporting standard No1 to prepare a cash flow statement on the grounds of its size.

#### 2.2 Incoming resources

Incoming resources including grants receivable are accounted for in the period in which the charitable company is entitled to receipt.

#### 2.3 Bequests and legacies

A legacy or bequest is recognised in the financial statements when the certainty of receipt and the amount receivable has been established.

#### 2.4 Resources expended

Expenditure is included on an accruals basis. The irrecoverable element of VAT is included with the item of expense to which it relates.

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in those cost categories. Other costs, which are attributable to more than one activity, are apportioned across cost categories on the basis of an estimate of the proportion of time spent by staff on those activities.

Grants payable are charged in the period when the offer is conveyed to the recipient except in those cases where the offer is conditional, such grants being recognised as expenditure when the conditions attaching are fulfilled. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the period end are noted as a commitment, but not accrued as expenditure.

#### 2.5 Unrestricted and designated funds

These funds have been made available to the trustees without specific conditions. The use of unrestricted funds is entirely at the discretion of the trustees. Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.

#### 2.6 Restricted funds

These funds are made available to the trustees with specific conditions imposed by the donors as to the nature of their use.

#### 2.7 Endowment funds

These include a permanent endowment fund which is to be held permanently and only the income from it is used for charitable activities. These also include expendable endowment funds which are primarily held to provide income but the trustees also have the option to spend the fund capital on charitable activities.

#### 2.8 Transfers

Transfers are made when appropriate from a specific fund to recover costs incurred not charged directly to that fund.

#### 2.9 Taxation

The company is a registered charity under the Charities Act 1993 and as such is exempt from taxation on its charitable activities.

#### 2.10 Pensions

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charitable company in an independently administered fund. The pension costs charged in the financial statements represent the contributions payable by the company during the year in accordance with FRS17.

#### 2.11 Fixed asset investments

Investments are stated in the financial statements at market value. Unrealised gains on investments are calculated by reference to the difference between market values from one year to the next. Realised gains or losses are calculated by reference to the difference between proceeds of sale and the carrying value of the investment at the previous year end.

#### 2.12 Operating leases

Rental charges are charged in the statement of financial activities on a straight line basis over the life of the lease.

#### 17 Restricted funds

Many of the restricted funds, the purposes of which are explained in the following detail represent monies managed by the charity on behalf of individuals and other organisations. These funds total in the region of £500,000 and in many respects therefore have the characteristics of endowment funds.

The Awards Ceremony is specifically for an annual awards ceremony.

Cornwall 100 Club Fund is for small community and voluntary groups throughout the county for projects which address any of seven specific themes.

The aim of the BBC Radio Cornwall Appeal Fund is to join with listeners in raising money for causes, projects and community groups based in and benefiting Cornwall.

The Benefiting Older People Fund awards grants to support projects that improve the quality of life of older people. Specifically to increase access to services, help them regain confidence, self esteem and encourage participation in activities which bring communities together.

Bristol & West Fund is to improve the quality of life and the environment.

The Lord Lieutenant's Fund for Youth aims to inspire and support ambition and talent in Cornwall's youth, particularly those of limited means, or suffering from hardship or disability, to realise their full potential.

LLFY – Lady Falmouth Fund is part of the Lord Lieutenant's Fund for Youth specifically to fund music.

The Lord and Lady St Levan Fund was established in memory of Lady St Levan with the aims of supporting charitable causes which she supported actively during her lifetime with later extensions to grant criteria.

The Crisis Fund provides grant assistance to individuals, families and communities in crisis situations.

The Caradon Area Community Fund is to provide grants to organisations in the Caradon area of Cornwall.

Adult Social Care Small Grants is to help adults who need extra support to live as independently as possible, with the focus of the projects being on social inclusion and integration.

The Development Fund is for the early years building of the Foundation.

The Truro College Fund provides awards and financial assistance for deserving students.

City of London Bursary fund is from monies raised by the Mayor of London for income generation to be used for people living in Cornwall who wish to study in Higher Education in local colleges and universities for deserving students in need. (This fund is part of the Lord Lieutenant's Fund for Youth).

Friends of Cornwall Community Foundation is for providing grants to specific projects chosen by the Friends.

MPP Fund is for projects associated with helping people with drug and alcohol problems.

The Morwenna funds are for the benefit of single carers or parents, living alone with children, who are in crisis, experiencing need, hardship and distress.

Grassroots Grants are for building stronger and more active communities by increasing small grant funding to community groups promoting sustainability.

Cornish Projects fund represents funding for general projects in the county and also donor directed monies for donor specified grants in Cornwall.

Cornwall Garden Society Fund is a bursary programme to support the study of gardening and horticulture by students who have demonstrated a desire and capacity to accomplish great things but are held back by personal or family hardship or disability.

Tuppenny Fund is to provide grants to organisations in the Restormel area of Cornwall.

G McCabe Fund is a donor directed fund for use at his discretion within a specific charitable criteria.

CFN Basis Fund contributes towards fund development costs.

China Clay Area Community Fund is to provide grants to organisations in the china clay area of Cornwall.

Penwith & IOS Area Community Fund is to provide grants to organisations in the Penwith and Isles of Scilly area of Cornwall.

Sport Relief Fund distributes grants on behalf of Comic Relief for sport related projects and community engagement.

Lord George Fund is a specific memorial fund for use in Cornwall.

Police Property Fund provides grants to prevent antisocial behaviour and to improve public confidence in the police.

Clare Milne Fund provides grants towards disability projects especially those which benefit disabled adults.

Carers Week Fund provides grants to raise awareness of carers.

London Club Fund is funded by people not resident in the county but visit regularly and is to provide grants to assist poverty and the disadvantaged in Cornwall.

Cornwall Flood Appeal Fund is to assist people in a specific area of mid-Cornwall affected by flooding in November 2010.

The Expendable Endowment Fund arose from a public appeal by the charity. The initial application was to use income only from the fund to make grants for the purposes set out in the charity's objects, however this has now changed to allow the capital to be used for supporting charitable activities.

The Permanent Endowment Fund created by the charity is to be used to generate income to award as grants for the purposes set out in the charity's objects.

Grassroots Challenge Fund is money claimed under the Grassroots challenge to build up a fund to provide sustainable funding for community groups and organisations. This is a permanent endowment fund from which only the income from the fund may be spent on charitable activities in specific areas for which match funds were raised.

Tuppenny Fund is a permanent endowment for income generation to provide grants and includes the Restormel ACF Endowment Fund.

China Clay Area Community Fund is a permanent endowment for income generation to provide grants in the china clay area of Cornwall.

Penwith & Isles of Scilly Area Community Fund is a permanent endowment for income generation to provide grants in the Penwith and Isles of Scilly area of Cornwall.

Caradon Area Community Fund is to provide grants in the Caradon area of Cornwall.

Lord George Endowment Fund is a permanent endowment for use in Cornwall.

Cornwall Glass & Glazing Fund is a permanent endowment to generate interest to distribute in grants.

Royston Leigh Fund is a permanent endowment to generate interest to distribute in grants.

Grassroots Endowment is a fund into which money is accumulated to be eligible for match funding to the Grassroots Challenge referred to above. This is an expendable endowment fund which is primarily held to provide income with the option also to spend the capital on charitable activities.

Acorn Funds are an expendable endowment for donors who want to engage in strategic long term giving which is used with interest to distribute in grants or re-invested to grow into a bigger fund.

Lord George Fund is an expendable endowment for use in Cornwall.

The Quinnian Acorn Fund is an expendable endowment to generate interest to distribute in grants.

LLFY Endowment Fund aims to inspire and support ambition and talent in Cornwall's youth, particularly those of limited means, or suffering from hardship or disability, to realise their full potential.

Morwenna Endowment Fund is for single carers or parents, living alone with children, who are in crisis, experiencing need, hardship and distress.

Friend's Endowment Fund is an expendable endowment to generate interest to distribute in grants.

Cornwall 100 Endowment Fund is for small community and voluntary groups throughout the county for projects which address any seven specific themes.

JH & AVDB Acorn Fund is an expendable endowment to generate interest to distribute in grants.

Mining District Fund is an expendable endowment.

DS Smith Acorn Fund is an expendable endowment to generate interest to distribute in grants.

Cornwall Crisp Company Acorn Fund is an expendable endowment to generate interest to distribute in grants.

Wales & West Acorn Fund is an expendable endowment to generate interest to distribute in grants.

Development Endowment Fund is an expendable endowment to generate interest to distribute in grants.
